As the City Bar's Judicial Selection Task Force recently found, "a diverse judiciary is necessary to ensure that our populations are appropriately represented; to ensure that a broad array of views and experiences are brought to the bench; to regain the public's confidence in the judiciary[;] and to restore the judicial system's credibility in the public's eyes."1 Consistent with these findings, the City Bar's judicial screening panel works to ensure the appointment and election of judges who demonstrate a commitment to the fundamental value of equality, in addition to the competence and experience, needed to be a fair and effective judge. We commend you for translating your public statements in support of the benefits of judicial diversity into action with your recent appointments to the First and Second Departments of the Appellate Division.

The City Bar of course shares your commitment to ensuring that judges be of the highest quality regardless of their backgrounds. Fortunately, there is no shortage of qualified candidates from the LGBT community and from communities of color, both of which are strikingly under-represented in the

judiciary, especially in the Supreme Court, the Appellate Division, and the Court of Appeals. It is noteworthy that no one from New York's large, vibrant, and diverse LGBT community currently sits on any of the State's appellate courts.

Now is the time for additional appointments to the Appellate Division which will promote both the quality and diversity of New York's courts. In this regard, we are aware that at least two candidates from the LGBT community have already been found qualified for your consideration by the New York State Judicial Screening Committee, and hopefully others are under consideration. All citizens of New York will be better served through your advancement of the goal of a more diverse bench.
